In 1992,
Prospects
Literacy piloted
its first family literacy
program, Books Offer
Our Kids Success
(B.O.O.K.S) as a way to
reach learners not coming
to traditional adult literacy
programs.

The holistic approach of family literacy supported social, emotional, and intellectual outcomes naturally.

Family literacy built positive family learning situations, strengthened by being practical and relevant for all involved.

More programs quickly followed

Caregivers built their own literacy skills while learning how to support their children's development.

Deciding on a new course can open up opportunities that can lead to great things.

In 2000, with over **200,000 volunteer hours** and after reaching **over 10,000 adults and children**, Prospects Literacy transitioned to become the **Centre for Family Literacy** (CFL).

CFL was the only organization of its kind, focusing on literacy development within the family context by:



Offering family and adult literacy programs in the Edmonton area



Providing training to professionals and organizations across sectors to build their capacity to do literacy in their own communities across Canada



Supporting adults, families, and professionals with resources and mentoring



Participating in research

Using a strengths-based, learner-centred, adaptive approach, we are able to make learning practical and relevant to everyone.

It's about **building connections** between literacy, learning, and all other parts of someone's life.

We have chosen to look forward, to see challenges as opportunities for innovation and growth. Through a pandemic, funding cuts, and more, we choose to look at what we have, not what we don't.

people kept telling me.




